Resources for Autism Spectrum Disorder

Autism spectrum disorder (ASD) is a brain disorder that impairs a person's behavior and ability to communicate and interact with others. Autism spectrum disorder can be mild or severe. No one knows what causes it. To be diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder, a child must show signs of the disorder in early childhood. Sometimes the symptoms do not show up until the child is in school. The signs of ASD include problems in social interaction and communication, and limited interests.

Counseling Services

- To access individual or family counseling using your health insurance benefits, call the "mental health benefits" number on your insurance card for referral to providers who accept your insurance. You can also access the website for your behavioral health insurance carrier to search for providers in your area and with the specialties you require.
